



MEANS OF TRANSPORTATION TO WORK

2010 Means of Transportation to Work



Bernalillo, Sandoval, and Valencia Counties

- The percentage of work commutes by public transit increased across the board from 2009, while the percentage of workers who carooled experienced an overall decrease.
- For the three counties, public transit, walking, and biking account for nearly 6 percent of all work commutes.
- Valencia County exhibited a significant decrease of people who worked at home (3.3 percent).
- Sandoval County and the City of Rio Rancho had the lowest share of workers who use alternative modes of transportation for their work commutes.



AVERAGE TRAVEL TIME TO WORK

- Valencia County experienced the longest commutes to work at 30.6 minutes. More than half of its working population are crossing county lines to get to their jobs.
- Once again, the City of Albuquerque exhibited the shortest average travel times to work reflecting its status as the employment center for the region.
- From 2009 to 2010, all three counties saw increases in the time spent commuting to work.
- Out of all three counties, Valencia County holds the highest percentage of zero-car households (6.9 percent).
- Rio Rancho exhibits the highest number of vehicles per household.
